The SNAP Program

Surrey's Natural Areas Partnership (SNAP) is a unique program that brings together the Green Timbers Heritage Society, Sunnyside Acres Heritage Society, White Rock and Surrey Naturalists Society, and <u>City of Surrey. SNAP's goa</u>l is to restore, enhance and promote stewardship of Surrey's urban forest.

SNAP provides meaningful work experience for youth who are interested in pursuing careers in the environmental sector. Since 2001, SNAP has employed over 230 students, many of whom have gone on to related careers across the Lower Mainland and beyond.

The summer team consisted of two teams – the Field and Outreach Team – with a total of ten youth. Youth work to enhance natural areas, care for City trees and educate the community about the urban forest.

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Field Team



"Getting hired by SNAP was one of my biggest accomplishments. I didn't have a lot of work experience related to the environmental field and this job has equipped me with skills and experience that will help me in the future. I am very proud of the work I have done this year and I am excited for the future." – Jared, Field Team Leader The Field Team works to restore, maintain and enhance the ecological integrity and functioning of natural areas in Surrey. They remove invasive plants, pick up litter, maintain previous planting sites, and provide tree well renovations to shade trees.

This summer, the Field Team worked in 30 different parks across Surrey, removing 17 invasive plant species. In total, the team removed 196 m³ of invasive plant material covering over 6470 m² of natural areas. The team also provided base maintenance for shade trees covering 4613 m².

The team also worked with the Salmon Habitat Restoration Program (SHaRP) at Hyland Creek Park and Mud Bay Park. Together, they removed invasive species along creeks to enhance the urban forest and wetland habitat for local wildlife. In the fall, SNAP and SHaRP will return to Hyland Creek Park to restore the area by planting native trees and shrubs.

The Field Team contributed great value and hard work in caring for Surrey's urban forest.

Urban Forest Outreach Team

The Urban Forest Outreach Team raises awareness of the benefits of urban forests, promotes environmental stewardship, and fosters a sense of community connection with Surrey's parks.

The Urban Forest Outreach Team was active in 13 parks throughout Surrey, providing nature interpretation and information about parks and City services. They interacted with over 320 park users and removed over 90 litres of litter, while providing positive messaging on how to maintain Surrey parks' beauty and appreciate the value and benefits they provide.

This year, the team learned to engage with the community on virtual platforms such as social media, online webinars and by developing educational videos to support our non-profit society partners. They engaged with over 60 youth through Online Youth Nights to encourage high school volunteers to be stewards of Surrey's parks. In addition, they taught high school volunteers the importance of removing invasive species and how to safely do it.
